1. Situation. This order implements practices that regulate fish and wildlife management aboard the depot. References (a) and (b) require the Marine Corps to enforce laws to protect natural resources. These laws include federal and state wildlife laws, natural resource laws, and endangered and threatened species laws. Reference (a) outlines environmental and natural resource procedures and safeguards. Reference (c) establishes South Carolina (SC) hunting regulations. Reference (d) establishes proper procedures for transporting privately owned firearms in privately owned vehicles (POVs) aboard the depot. A depot bulletin will be promulgated annually to ensure appropriate and humane reduction of deer aboard Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island (MCRD, PI).

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2. Cancellation. DepO 5090.3A.

3. Mission. Establish and enforce regulations to protect the natural resources and personnel of MCRD, PI from any misuse of that environment. This must be accomplished while allowing the military mission of MCRD, PI to be executed.

4. Execution

a. Commander's Intent. Implement and maintain a natural resources management and enforcement program. Method: this order explains the correct procedures to harvest fish, deer, and shellfish. It outlines how to handle sick or injured wildlife and nuisance wildlife, and explains how to obtain any required licensing. This order also gives notice to personnel that penalties may be incurred for the violation of these regulations. The end state is to create and support a military and civilian culture that strives to protect wetlands, forestry, wildlife, and personnel from any misuse of the natural resources inherent to MCRD, PI while allowing for efficient execution of the military mission of MCRD, PI.

b. Concept of Operations. This order applies to all persons aboard the depot. The provisions contained in this order are obligatory, and must be implemented by way of the chain-of-command throughout military and civilian components of the installation, and tenant activities. The Conservation Law Enforcement Officer (CLEO) and Provost Marshal's Office (PMO) are responsible for the enforcement of DepO 5090.3B, by order of the Commanding General (CG).

(1) Fishing. Individuals authorized to harvest fish on MCRD, PI include active and retired military personnel, their dependents, house guests of military personnel when accompanied by the sponsor, and civilian employees. The civilian community may fish aboard the depot for recreation when current security posture and depot operations permit. Enclosure (1) provides detailed depot fishing regulations and information.

(2) Hunting. Recreational hunting is prohibited. Game management hunts may be permitted when necessary. These hunts are coordinated by the Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Office (NREAO). Enclosure (4) provides detailed depot deer reduction hunt information.

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(3) Shellfish. Shellfish harvest is permitted on land and water areas of the depot, as detailed in Enclosures (2) and (3). Shellfish harvest seasons and limit-regulations are established by the State of SC in Reference (c).

(4) Sick or injured wildlife. Wildlife that appears to be injured, sick, or displays aggressive behavior must be avoided and reported to the PMO Desk Sergeant at (843) 228-3444, or (843) 321-6633. The desk sergeant will coordinate with the depot CLEO for disposition.

(5) Nuisance Wildlife. Wildlife that interrupts training, causes annoyance, or endangers health and welfare by coming in close contact with personnel is deemed nuisance wildlife. This wildlife will be handled or removed by natural resources personnel. Nuisance wildlife can include snakes, alligators, birds and mammals.

(6) Licenses. All persons who hunt or fish aboard the depot and waters surrounding MCRD, PI must physically carry the appropriate licenses required by SC state laws for the species harvested. All SCDNR laws relative to hunting and fishing must be observed and adhered to by personnel engaged in such activities aboard the depot. Laws are enforced by the depot CLEO per current TITLE 50 SCDNR Regulations for Hunting and Fishing, as found in Reference (c). These regulations are available through MCCA at MCAS, or similar commercial establishments that sell hunting and fishing licenses. Regulations may also be viewed and printed online at www.dnr.sc.gov.

(7) Violations. Failure to comply with this order and regulations outlined in Reference (c) may result in the forfeiture of fishing and hunting privileges for individuals aboard the depot, and may also result in the issuance of a United States Court Violations Notice (Form 1805) by the CLEO. This/these violation(s) can result in monetary fines to the US Treasury via the Federal Central Violations Bureau, in either Charlotte, NC or Atlanta, GA. Active-duty personnel are also subject to the Uniformed Code of Military Justice (UCMJ), and may also be charged with violating Article 92 failure to obey an order or regulation.

5. Administration and Logistics. Recommendations concerning the contents of this order may be forwarded to NEARO/G-4 via the appropriate chain of command.

6. Command and Signal.

a. Command. This Order is applicable to the Marines, sailors, and civilians of MCRD, PI.

b. Signal. This Order is effective the date signed.

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FISHING REGULATIONS

1. General. The CLEO has primary oversight for enforcement of fishing and boating regulations. PMO also have the authority to examine licenses, equipment and creel limits. When PMO determine or suspect a violation of wildlife regulations has occurred, they should coordinate enforcement with the CLEO. Violators are subject to issuance of a United States District Court Violation Notice (Form 1805), confiscation of their catch, and possible denial of future fishing privileges aboard the depot.
2. The recreational harvest of fish and shellfish on the depot and surrounding waters shall be in accordance with all applicable federal and state regulations for SC, and requires a valid SC State Saltwater Fishing License Reference (c).
3. Fishing from the top of Ballast Creek and Berkeley Bridge is prohibited. Fishing from the catwalk under Berkeley Bridge at Archer's Creek is permitted.
4. Department of Defense (DoD) regulations prohibit the use of any amenity or recreational facility for commercial enterprise. For example, recreational facilities and overland access, which includes boat ramps and landings aboard the depot, may not be used for commercial fishing, crabbing or any other commercial venture.
5. Fishing from any freshwater pond aboard the depot requires personnel to possess a current SC State Freshwater Fishing License.
6. Third Battalion Pond. This is the saltwater impoundment located between the two causeways that connect Horse Island and Parris Island:
 - a. Private boats are not authorized on the impoundment.
 - b. No commercial guiding or similar activity allowed on the impoundment.
 - c. No fishing is allowed on the impoundment. Fishing is defined as all activity and effort involved in taking or attempting to take fish. This includes: hook and line, gigging, set nets, cast nets, dip nets, seines, traps, trotlines, baskets, or similar devices. A fish is defined as finfish, shellfish including mollusks (oysters and clams), crustaceans

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(all forms of crabs, shrimp, crayfish, stone crabs, lobsters, and any other motile fish having a chitonized shell), horseshoe crabs, whelks, conchs, turtles, and terrapin or products thereof.

- d. No swimming or wading is allowed in the impoundment.
- e. Caution should be taken in walking the banks of the impoundment due to the presence of alligators.

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COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT
FOR CONSERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT OF
INTERTIDAL SHELLFISH RESOURCES
ON MARINE CORPS RECRUIT DEPOT
PARRIS ISLAND, SOUTH CAROLINA

This Cooperative Agreement provides for the protection, development, and management of the intertidal shellfish resources at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island, South Carolina.

The area covered by this Agreement includes that certain land and water area in Beaufort County, South Carolina, south of Archer's Creek and immediately adjacent to and surrounding Parris Island, beginning at the high water mark and extending outward to the channels of Port Royal Sound to the south, Broad River to the west, and Beaufort River to the east, all of which are a part of the land taken by proclamation of the President of the United States (No. 1472) dated August 7, 1918, issued pursuant to Act of Congress approval July 1, 1918.

This area is characterized by expanses of salt marsh (chiefly vegetated by Spartina alterniflora) intersected by tidal creeks, and intertidal shorelines and flats consisting of mud, or mud-sand and shell bottoms. Oyster bars are found along the shorelines of the creeks and rivers between the high and low water marks. The intertidal flats, shores and creeks also contain abundant populations of hard clams.

Whereas, the military authorities in charge of the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island, South Carolina and the South Carolina Wildlife and Marine Resources Department have a mutual desire and interest that the shellfish populations of the Depot be properly managed and harvested on a long range basis; and

Whereas, it is necessary that the military, and the South Carolina Wildlife and Marine Resources Department agree upon certain matters to the end that the area can best be managed consistent with the military mission;

NOW FOR AND IN CONSIDERATION of the mutual promises of one part to the other, it is agreed:

The purpose of the Cooperative Agreement for the Depot is to:

- a. Protect and preserve the intertidal shellfish as vital elements of an optimum fish and wildlife program;
- b. Utilize and care for natural resources in the combination best serving the present and future needs of the United States and its people;
- c. Provide for optimum multiple use without jeopardizing the ecological stability of land and water areas and access thereto for the enjoyment of and use by the public in compliance with the natural resources policies

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and goals of the United States except where the Commanding General of the Depot has made a specific finding that the overriding military mission requires a temporary or permanent suspension of such use; and

d. To establish and enhance community relations among the parties hereto and the general public.

ARTICLE I

The Depot agrees as follows:

a. The Commanding General will provide access for designated State Wildlife or Marine Conservation officials to accomplish the objectives of this agreement.

b. State conservation officials shall be provided identification card and pass permit (DD Form 1221) by the installation commander for use pursuant to this Agreement.

c. The land and water area covered by this Agreement is set forth on the map attached hereto and made a part hereof. Such area will be made available within the limitations of necessary safety and security regulations and existing land management programs for recreational and commercial shellfishing mutually agreeable to the parties hereto. The Commanding General will provide assistance in carrying out State research management practices on the Depot.

d. Public participation in the harvests commensurate with military objectives shall be permitted, provided the shellfish population is sufficient to accommodate a greater number of persons than normally have access to the Depot for the purpose of shellfish harvesting. Members of the general public shall stand at par with each other.

e. Rules and regulations pertaining to shellfish harvesting at the Depot are attached hereto as enclosure (1) and made a part hereof. These will become a part of the Depot Fish and Wildlife Management Order.

f. This Agreement will be included as a part of the Depot Long Range Fish and Wildlife Plan.

ARTICLE II

The South Carolina Wildlife and Marine Resources Department agrees as follows:

a. To provide all necessary technical assistance for the establishment and development of a sound shellfish management program.

b. To survey and inventory the existing shellfish resources of the area as often as is necessary in order to manage the resource.

c. To establish a shellfish management plan, to include the issuance of commercial permits, the regulation of seasons, harvesting methods, and

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limits in accordance with the statutory and regulatory authorization prescribed under Title 50, South Carolina Code of Laws, as amended, and in keeping with Depot policy regarding commercial shellfish harvesting. This plan will become a part of this Agreement when prepared and must be approved by the Depot before implementation. No fees are charged for the permits since a commercial license is required to obtain said permit. No portion of the license fee collected, or other compensation, will be paid the Depot.

d. To conduct patrols of the area and enforce the provisions of the appropriate shellfish laws and regulations.


e. To communicate commercial access by water routes, and otherwise coordinate shellfish management and regulatory activities with the appropriate personnel at the Depot.

f. To provide the Commanding General with a brief annual report of activities conducted by the State by 10 October of each year. Such report shall include the results of any surveys conducted during the year, number permits issued, reported commercial harvests, recommendations to the Depot, and other information of interest.

ARTICLE III


This Agreement will be in effect indefinitely, but may be modified or amended by mutual agreement by the authorized representatives of the agencies; providing, however, that the Commanding General, upon written notice to the Executive Director, South Carolina Wildlife and Marine Resources Department, shall have the right to terminate this Agreement in whole or in part at any time when, in the opinion of the Commanding General, the primary mission of the Depot or other requirements of the National Defense make it necessary to do so. Only mutual agreement by the Commanding General and the Executive Director may terminate this Agreement for other reasons.




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Rules and Regulations Governing Shellfish Harvesting at Parris Island

1. General

a. Personnel allowed to participate in the harvest of shellfish on the depot are military personnel, active and retired, their dependents, house guests of military personnel when accompanied by the sponsor, and civilian employees. Overland access to shellfish grounds (for recreational harvesting only) is authorized for the above personnel. Overland access by the general civilian community for recreational shellfish harvesting may be authorized when the current security posture and Depot operations permit.

b. Recreational shellfish harvesting is restricted to the hours between sunrise and sunset on Tuesdays and Thursdays and requires a valid SC State Salt Water Fishing License.

c. Harvest limits are established by State regulations.

2. Commercial Harvest.

a. Commercial shellfish harvesting from depot facilities will not be allowed. Access for commercial harvesting to the areas covered in Enclosure (2) shall only be from the surrounding waterways.

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DEER REDUCTION HUNT

1. General. To be eligible for game management hunts, applicants must complete a Parris Island Shotgun Application Card, Enclosure (6), which encompasses the Hold Harmless Agreement. Only authorized personnel may participate. These include: Active duty, active duty dependants, military retirees, Tri-Command civil service employees, non-appropriated funds employees, and previously certified personnel.

a. Previously certified civilians will also be required to complete a background check via the Friends of Parris Island Application Form, Enclosure (8).

b. State law requires all applicants born after June 30, 1979 to complete a SCDNR approved hunter education course prior to issuance of a state license.

c. Those active duty military personnel awaiting disciplinary action or separation as a result of disciplinary action are not permitted to hunt.

d. Safety requirements dictate that dependents and non-military personnel under the age of 18 are not eligible.

e. Individuals register for the chance to participate in the hunt by placing their application package (Enclosures (5), (6), (7) and if required (8)) in a designated 'Controlled Hunt' drop box. The box is located in the Natural Resources Office at building 864. Application deadlines will be established in a separate Depot Bulletin. Late applications will only be accepted from active duty personnel who, due to a recent transfer, have not had an opportunity to meet the above mentioned deadline. Only one application may be entered per person.

f. The natural resources office will utilize a fair method, such as a lottery-type drawing, to choose the participants of the hunt and to assign all deer-stands. Registered applicants will be drawn from a 'hat' to fill available stands (up to 20). Once the applicants are selected, a separate drawing will be conducted to assign stands. Those chosen for the first hunt will not be included in the draw for the second or subsequent hunts until all registered applicants are selected. Applicants not selected may be present at any hunt as stand-by hunters to fill vacancies created by selected hunters not in attendance. Stand-by hunters will be drawn from a 'hat,' with

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first priority given to Active Duty Members. Specific hunt dates will be published in a separate Depot Bulletin.

g. Every selected hunter must attend the orientation brief held prior to the commencement of all hunting activities, regardless of past hunting or weapons experience.

h. The CLEO is the only authorized hunt master.

2. Prospective hunters must obtain firearms certification through the NREAO. Parris Island Certification numbers are valid for an indefinite period, and are maintained by NREAO. Personnel who certified in prior years are not required to re-certify. An Officer in Charge (OIC 1), and Range Safety Officer (RSO 2) employed by MCCA and certified by Weapons and Field Training Battalion will conduct the certification, which will take place on the recreational firing range on Saturdays from 0800 to 1200.

3. Prospective hunters must furnish their own shotgun and ammunition. Hunters must have at least fifteen rounds each of slug ammunition in their possession. To certify, the hunter must demonstrate safe operation of their weapon while firing five rounds from either the standing or seated bench position. The shooter must place three of the five slug rounds into a 12 inch circle from 25 yards. The shooter will be allowed two additional attempts for a total of three attempts in one day.

4. Certification numbers are issued after applicants are deemed qualified by the certified range instructor. Certification numbers must be recorded on the shotgun application card from Encl (6) by an NREAO representative. To be valid, application cards require the signature of the SCDNR certified instructor.

5. As per Reference (d), all privately owned weapons brought aboard MCRD, PI must be unloaded and locked in the trunk of the transport vehicle. If the weapon cannot be locked in the trunk, it must be locked with a trigger-guard or similar device in such a way that the weapon is inoperable until unlocked.

a. If a hunter resides in housing aboard the depot, the weapon must be registered with the PMO within three working days of introducing the weapon to the depot. While transported, this weapon must be secured in the above prescribed manner, transported only by the registered owner, and the owner must have the weapon's registration receipt issued by the PMO in his/her possession.

b. No transported weapon shall be concealed from view at any time aboard the depot, whether by person or vehicular transport.

c. A Military Traffic Citation may be issued for the violation of these regulations. Active duty personnel, retired personnel, family members, and civilians will be directed to appear before the District Traffic Court. Aggravated cases may also be referred to the U.S. Magistrate.

6. Selected hunters are contacted at least five days prior to the hunt to confirm the time and location of the orientation brief.

a. All persons who participate in deer hunts aboard MCRD, PI must have a current SC Hunting License and Big Game Permit.

b. Authorized weapons are limited to 10, 12, 16, and 20 gauge shotguns. Only slugs and '00' or '000' buck shot are allowed.

c. The daily 'take' limit will be determined by NREAO personnel based on harvest requirements.

d. It is illegal to harvest any wildlife other than deer.

7. Deer hunts are conducted on specified Saturdays and will start after the orientation-brief. All hunts must end one hour after sunset. Deer hunts are planned for the areas of Page Field, Elliott's Beach, Horse Island, the wooded areas south of Chicken Farm Road, and Weapons and Field Training Battalion (WFTBn) wooded areas downrange from the rifle-ranges.

8. Additional hunting sites may be designated by Depot NREAO personnel on specified hunt days. These areas are only hunted when they are determined free from use and/or not in close proximity to Depot personnel.

9. If WFTBn schedules range firing on a planned deer hunt date, then hunting in range areas will be cancelled or delayed as appropriate.

10. If recruit training is scheduled on a planned deer hunt date, then hunting in that area will be cancelled or delayed as appropriate.

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11. NREAO personnel must notify the PMO, the Command Duty Officer, the Recruit Training Regiment, and the WFTBn Officers of the Day one hour prior to the commencement of each hunt, and at the conclusion of every hunt. NREAO will provide PMO with a roster of scheduled hunters the day prior to the hunt.
12. All persons selected for a given hunt must report to the CLEO at Building 956 on Horse Island no later than 1400 or 1500 as designated on the hunt date for an orientation brief. Selected personnel who fail to report by the specified check-in time will forfeit the privilege to participate in that hunt, and a stand-by hunter will be selected.
13. At check-in/orientation, each hunter must present a valid ID card and current year SC Hunting License with Big Game Permit. Every individual must have an international orange vest and hat at check-in, and all personnel must wear them at all times, even while walking to and from the hunt area.
14. After orientation, individuals are divided into groups based on their deer-stand number, and then proceed to a designated vehicle for transport to their respective hunt areas. Participants may not drive their POVs to any stand area unless that individual has been designated by NREAO personnel.
15. Hunters must use the ladder tree-stands provided by MCRD, PI. Stands are posted with designated stand numbers marked in red. Every stand is equipped with a safety strap. Hunters shall attach the strap to themselves and to the tree whenever they are elevated above the ground. Hunting from the ground is forbidden unless approved by NREAO personnel. Only designated stand locations, already established by NREAO, may be used. Hunters may not change the stand's location. It is the hunter's responsibility to be in the correct stand or to ask the NREAO representative or CLEO if the hunter is uncertain of their stand number. Weapons may not be loaded until the respective hunter is positioned in the stand.
16. Hunt areas are scouted to determine whether deer are traveling through in adequate numbers to maximize deer sightings prior to the hunt dates.
17. If the hunter suspects a deer is mortally wounded and it leaves the immediate area, the hunter may leave the stand and mark the location of any blood and hair where the deer was shot. The hunter must immediately return to their stand or to the perimeter road if darkness approaches. Tracking wounded deer is

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prohibited in all circumstances. At the hunt's conclusion and when all hunters are accounted for, the hunter(s) may ask permission to return to the marked area to search for deer. Hunters are encouraged to bring flashlights to assist searches.

18. Vehicle horns will be sounded at the conclusion of the hunt. Hunters will be at their drop-off points no later than one hour after sunset. All shotguns must be unloaded and placed on safe, with the chamber breech open, before any hunter descends from their deer-stand. Hunters must bring any harvested deer to the side of the road.

19. Field-dressing deer is prohibited. Deer must be brought to the perimeter road after the hunt. Individuals who wish to dress their deer on Parris Island are provided a lighted cleaning-rack area. All deer classified as antlerless deer require an attached permit tag before transport from the Depot. Deer will be weighed, the gender recorded, and one half of the lower jawbone removed at the designated deer processing center. Jawbones are tagged and sent to the SCDNR Deer Biologist. At times, deer-parts such as the heart and liver must be surrendered from harvested deer for scientific study by SCDNR biologists.

20. Any violation of hunt rules will result in immediate suspension of the hunter's privilege and confiscation of any illegal game in the hunter's possession. NREAO will review each violation and make recommendations to the Assistant Chief of Staff, Installation and Logistics for action.

21. Tasks. Tasks carried out by NREAO, the CLEO, volunteer-coordinator, PMO, and MCCS:

a. The NREAO provides general support for the deer herd management hunts by erecting enough ladder-type stands to conduct the hunts, conducting population counts, providing scales, meat saws, gambles, and jawbone extraction tools.

b. CLEO:

- (1) Pre-season stand location scouting.
- (2) Brush cutting.
- (3) Stand location marking.
- (4) Maintenance and placement of stands.

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- (5) Season-long distribution of corn to deer stands (corning).
- (6) Administer orientation brief for hunt.
- (7) Transport and placement of hunters to deer stands.
- (8) On-site safety-observer.
- (9) Transport of hunters and taken-game to designated skinning rack.
- (10) Antlerless-deer tagging.
- (11) End-of-season stand retrieval.

c. The volunteer-coordinator may be any person who is eligible to participate in the hunt. The volunteer coordinator assists the CLEO by providing personnel to conduct the following tasks:

- (1) Provide to the CLEO a list of potential personnel requiring background checks prior to their being granted access to participate in hunt support activities.
- (2) Assist with hunt support activities.
- (3) Conduct registration during certification firing.
- (4) Monitor and control traffic in designated areas on hunt days.
- (5) Assist NREAO personnel who evaluate the harvested deer (i.e. weighing, gender determination and jawbone removal).

d. The PMO assists by providing traffic barricades and traffic cones to prevent vehicular access to designated areas on hunt days. NREAO personnel coordinate with PMO to barricade access to Elliott's Beach Road after dark on the Friday evening before each Saturday hunt.

e. Marine Corps Community Services (MCCS) ensures no events are scheduled for the Elliott's Beach area on the day of the planned hunts.

I understand and will comply with the following instructions. Additionally, I understand that all SC Dept. of Natural Resources hunting regulations apply and must be adhered to. I further understand that any violation thereof subjects me to possible disciplinary, civil and/or administrative action as appropriate, and may prohibit me from participating in future game management reduction programs aboard MCRD, Parris Island. Specifically, I understand:

- a. I must have the appropriate state license, as well as a big game permit.
- b. 10, 12, 16 and 20 gauge shotguns are the only approved weapons. Slugs and '00 or 000' buck shot are the only authorized shells that will be utilized during the hunt. The use or carrying of handguns is prohibited.
- c. All personnel will wear patches of international orange colored material, not less than one square foot in size, on both the front and rear portions of the upper body, as well as an orange hat, at all times. This includes walking to and from a stand, as well as while on the stand. All weapons will be unloaded and cased or carried in a gun box when being transported by privately owned vehicle to and from the Building 956 area.
- d. Personnel shall not leave their assigned stand or change stands unless authorized by NREAO personnel. Weapons will not be fired after leaving stand except for finishing off a downed deer.
- e. Personnel will have weapons unloaded, upon entering and departing the woods. Weapons will not be loaded until personnel are safely strapped into the tree stand.
- f. The only vehicles allowed in the hunt areas are those authorized by NREAO. Personnel may not drive their POV into the hunt areas unless designated to transport assigned hunters.
- g. The daily take limit will be specified by NREAO personnel based on harvest requirements.
- h. All personnel must return to the drop off point within one hour after sunset. Time will be adjusted on the day of each hunt. At the conclusion of the hunt the assigned hunt master for each area will signal hunters by sounding vehicle horns.
- i. All deer must have the weight recorded and half of the lower jawbone extracted. Deer will not be field-dressed (gutted) in the field. All antlerless deer must have the appropriate SCDNR antlerless deer tag attached prior to departing the Depot.
- j. Each person must shoot only from the NREAO provided tree stand. All personnel must wear a safety strap provided while in the stand.
- k. No alcohol will be consumed prior to the hunt or during any phase of the hunt. The hunt will conclude when all deer have been recorded and skinned and all NREAO equipment has been cleaned and returned to the storage compound. No cell phones will be used during the hunt except for emergencies or to report an unsafe situation to the CLEO. No headphones or other distracting type devices will be utilized during the hunt.
